Start of autumn term arrangements


A reminder of arrangements for the start of term in September:

Wednesday 4th September: school opens for ALL students at the normal time.



aware of the following guidance to help aid decision-making.

Skirts – the uniform shop will be selling an alternative style of skirt as a response to feedback from students. Still in the same tartan colours, they will sell a straight pencil-skirt style skirt, which students say will be more comfortable.

We are still concerned about the number of students who roll their kilts to an extent that they are too short for a formal, school, environment.

We require all skirts to be at least mid-thigh in length and hope that the alternative style will end this culture. Please note that for students who continually roll skirts, we will require them

to wear the trouser option. Ultimately, if this practice continues, we may need to review the uniform and consider

moving to trousers for all students. This would be a great shame as the tartan kilt is such an icon for the school's heritage.

Respecting our Community

Please could parents remind students of the need to respect our community both when travelling to and from school and over the holidays. We have had some complaints about them using private property as cut-throughs, such as Windsor Lane, which has upset residents.

As you are aware, we work closely with Knaresborough police and town council. The police led assemblies earlier in the year about anti-social behaviour in the community. We are delighted to report that between June 2023 and January 2024 there has been a decrease of 23%. Please continue to keep reporting and feeding information to the police about problems, so that incidents can be dealt with in real time. Thank you.

GCSE PE Aspirations day - Leeds Beckett University

On Monday 15th July, the Year 10 GCSE PE pupils had the opportunity to visit Leeds Beckett University. The aim of the day was to provide the pupils with knowledge of careers in the sporting sector, possible university courses and be inspired by the amazing facilities at Leeds Beckett sports campus in Headingly.

The day was full of variety, starting with a lecture on sports courses at university and information about Leeds as a city. The pupils then experienced a tour of the facilities and some strength and conditioning activation work.

After lunch it was time for a lecture on the role of the Sports Psychologist and how they fit into the team framework. The practical elements to the afternoon included a VO2 max fitness test on the impressive indoor track and athletic sessions across the different disciplines.

It was an eye-opening day for the pupils which will hopefully provide the motivation for the upcoming exam season, but also light the fire to continue their journeys in the sporting sector. We as a school can't thank Leeds Beckett enough for their welcoming approach and giving up their time for such a day. Thanks to Jamie, Andi, Bailey, Abbie, Katie and all the facilities team for their inputs and making it a truly special day.









Student Catering news

We have had a lot of positive feedback about the quality and variety of food on offer at break and lunchtime this year and will be making further improvements next term.

We will continue to offer a variety of options, including hot main meals, rice, noodles, hot sandwiches, grab-and-go items, buildyour-own sandwiches, and build-your-own salads. Our hot meal range will start from £2, and sandwiches from £1.60. We will upload our new 4-week menus and price list over the summer.

Our offer of a 'meal deal' is particularly popular, and from September we will continue to offer a hot meal and dessert for £2.80. However, this deal will no longer include a drink.

There are two reasons for making this change. Firstly, as a school, we want to take positive steps towards reducing the amount of single-use plastic we use for environmental reasons. We have already changed a lot of our packaging to include more biodegradable options earlier in the year to reduce plastic waste. Students will be able to fill up their water bottles at no charge all year round which we hope will result in less plastic waste. Please encourage your child to bring a reusable bottle to school to do so.

Secondly, as parents will no doubt be aware, there have been significant increases in the cost of ingredients and energy costs in the last 2 years. We have worked closely with suppliers to manage the impact of this. We will continue to subsidise free school meals to the value of £2.80, which is more than we receive in funding.

Staff training day

On Monday 2nd September, all our staff will be taking part in Positive Regard Practitioner training. This is part of our strategy to supporting a consistent, and relational, approach to managing behaviour, and to helping students learn to manage their emotions in everyday situations.

We will be revisiting this training throughout the year as we embed consistent approaches to behaviour management.

Knaresborough Youth Council

This week students heard about an exciting new opportunity from Chloe Thwaites (Youth Voice and Creative Engagement Office, NYCC). A new Youth Council is being set up in Knaresborough to allow young people from Year 6 to 13 to raise and discuss issues that are affecting them or the community with the aim to give young people a voice.

There are opportunities for two people per year group to be elected as Youth Councillor and Deputy Youth Councillor. If your child would like to nominate themselves then they need to submit 150 words on their personal strengths and the two big issues they feel young people are facing that they would like to work on.
