Week 1	Module 1 – Qui suis-je? <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Learn vocabulary• Present tense (regular, irregular and reflexives)• Adjectival agreement• Describe yourself and a friend/ family member• Describe family relationships• Future tense• Perfect tense• Describing an event in the past• Imperfect tense• Describing yourself when you were younger• Talk about someone you admire
Week 2	Module 2 – Le temps des loisirs <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Learn vocabulary• Talk about what activities I do/ play with opinions and when• Talk about what I have done and will do in my freetime• Use the comparative and superlative• Talk about how I use technology (in a variety of tenses)• Talk about reading habits (in a variety of tenses)• Direct object pronouns• Talk about what I watch (in a variety of tenses)• Talk about cinema and films
Week 3	Module 3 – Jours ordinaires, jours de fête <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Learn vocabulary• Revise food and the use of the partitive (some)• Talk about different festivals• Revise the past and future tenses to say how you celebrated and how you will celebrate a particular event (Christmas, birthday, Easter)• Talk about the pros and cons of marriage
Week 4	Module 4 – De la ville à la campagne <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Learn vocabulary

Week 5	Module 5 – Les vacances <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Learn vocabulary • Revise the present, past and future tenses • Revise the conditional tense to talk about ideal holidays • Revise vocabulary relating to booking a hotel or a travel ticket • Revise vocabulary and structures needed to order food in a restaurant • Revise the comparative • Revise the use of the pluperfect tense (higher)
Week 6	Module 6 – Au collège <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Revise vocabulary • Use a range of opinions and reasons to talk about school subjects • Talk about your daily routine and school routine using reflexives • Understand and tell the time • Describe your school and its facilities • Compare your school to French schools and the French system • Direct object pronouns • Use il faut and modal verbs to talk about school rules • Revise vocabulary for clothes to say what you wear to school • Revise the past tense to talk about a previous school trip (refer to holidays module) • Use the imperative and modal verbs to say what you should do to be healthy • Revise the past, present and future to talk about vices
Week 7	Grammar and translation <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Revisit the grammar points from each of the modules • Use languagesonline to practise key grammar points • Use the grammar and translation workbook to practice • Ensure you know key phrases in past, present and future tenses e.g. I go, I went, I will go
Week 8	Practice listening, reading and writing questions <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Revisit the vocab and grammar from each of the modules • You can complete practice reading, writing and listening questions using the purple workbook • Do the resume sections from the online textbook

How to revise

The key is to apply your knowledge. Don't just re-write notes and copy them out. Practice and learn them! It is more beneficial to learn vocabulary little and often. You could write out cue cards and stick them up in your bedroom or take them out with you when you go out in the car or on the bus! Create mind maps, use mnemonics and revision clocks. Make sure you cover all four skills, learn your speaking questions thoroughly and practice your writing skills within each topic.
